October is garlic planting time

With ghosts, goblins, and vampires on the prowl in October, it's the perfect time to plant your garlic for next spring. Garlic has long been viewed as a way to ward off vampires, according to European folklore. Whether that is fact or fiction, one thing is for sure, October is the time to plant garlic. Planting in the fall produces larger bulbs and more complex flavors. Garlic enhances food recipes and is seen as a traditional medicine in some cultures.



Garlic is best planted in the fall for harvesting next spring, usually in June. Nothing stores better after harvest than garlic because it is largely not affected by pests or diseases.

Place your garlic cloves in full sun and a well-drained, fertile site. Mix some organic matter like compost into the soil to provide more nutrients and to increase drainage. Plant cloves about 2 inches deep in the soil with the pointed end of the clove turned up. Prior to planting you should do a soil test to make sure your pH levels are between 6.0 and 6.5. Adding shredded leaves or straw on top will protect the cloves from cold winter and retain soil moisture. Be sure to put your garlic in a corner of your garden or a space where you won't be planting next spring. Each clove of garlic should be planted six inches apart and will produce a new head with six to eight cloves at harvest. You don't need to plant a lot of garlic, because a little will go a long way.

There are three types of garlic, the softneck, hardneck and elephant garlic. The softneck has two types, the artichoke and silver skin. Both are common garlic types sold in the supermarket and you have likely used them. The hardneck has large cloves, is easy to peel and has more intense flavor than softnecks. It also has a flower scape or flowering stem. Elephant garlic is a third type but is actually a member of the onion family and is considered a variant of the leek.

Fireside Turtle Pocket



Ingredients:

- 4 large turtle legs, about 2 ½ pounds
- 2 tablespoons dried minced onion
- 1 teaspoon black pepper
- Water to cover
- 4 tablespoons butter
- · 4 large potatoes, peeled and diced
- 4 carrots, peeled and cut into 1-inch lengths
- · 1 onion, chopped
- ¾ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder

Directions:

Place turtle legs, dried onion, and black pepper in a slow cooker. Add enough water to cover. Cook on high for 1 hour, reduce heat to low, and cook an additional 8 hours until meat is tender and falls off the bones. Pick out the meat and discard the bones and cartilage. Place a long sheet of heavy-duty foil on a large cookie sheet. The ends of the foil will hang off the pan. Slice butter into pats onto the foil. Place potatoes carrots, and onions in center of foil. Place potatoes, carrots, and onion in center of foil. Place turtle meat on top of vegetables, sprinkle with salt, pepper and garlic powder. Bring ends of foil to center and foil to seal in juices. Bake at 450 degrees F for 40 minutes or until potatoes are tender.



READ. LEARN. GROW. BRINGS PARTNERSHIP TO COMMUNITY

A powerful example of community collaboration has taken root in Mason County through a partnership between the Mason County Cooperative Extension Council, Mason County Detention Center, Mason County Public Library, and Mason County Housing Authority. Together, these organizations have expanded access to books and educational resources for local residents of all ages.

This project began with an idea from Horticulture Agent Macy Fawns, who envisioned making literacy more accessible. Inmates at the Mason County Detention Center volunteered to design, build, and paint book boxes, while staff helped place them in the community. The Mason County Public Library stocked the boxes with books for children and adults, and Cooperative Extension added educational kits to promote lifelong learning. The Housing Authority helped identify the best community locations.

Three book boxes are now available thanks to these efforts. "This project is a true testament to what happens when different parts of our community come together for the benefit of others," said Ann Porter, President of the Mason County Cooperative Extension Council. The Read. Learn. Grow. Initiative continues to enrich the community, inspire readers, and highlight the power of partnership.



OPENS DOORS FOR MASON COUNTY INMATES

We are proud to celebrate the successful close of the Commercial Applicator Grant Program at the Mason County Detention Center. This initiative represents countless hours of dedication, as 10 inmates committed themselves to studying in hopes of bettering their futures and finding meaningful careers upon release. Their perseverance and determination are truly commendable, resulting in a total of 15 certifications earned.

The Commercial Applicator Program in Kentucky provides training and certification for individuals applying pesticides for hire or in governmental/research roles. The University of Kentucky's Pesticide Safety Education Program (PSEP) supplies training materials and education, while the Kentucky Department of Agriculture (KDA) administers the exams and issues licenses. Certified applicators may specialize in areas such as ornamental and turf care, aquatic pest control, or right-of-way management. To maintain certification, applicators must also complete ongoing continuing education.

This program at the detention center was made possible through the efforts of Mason County Horticulture Agent Macy Fawns, who secured the grant and devoted time to teaching, along with Program Assistant Kimberly Bailey, who joined her in leading study sessions and proctoring the online exam through the KDA. A special thank you also goes to Jailer Lisa Yeary for her support in fostering this opportunity.

We are also deeply thankful for the partnership with the Kentucky Career Center. Their team has been amazing to work with, dedicating countless hours to help connect these gentlemen with job opportunities upon release, ensuring that the certifications they worked so hard to earn can translate into meaningful careers.

"This program shows the power of education and second chances," said Mason County Horticulture Agent Macy Fawns. "These gentlemen put in the work, showed incredible determination, and earned certifications that will help open doors for their future careers."


